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Sample Q&A

How is this version of the Gaian Tarot different from previous ones?

This is actually the fourth incarnation of the Gaian Tarot. I self-published a handmade, majors-only deck in 2004, followed by a Collector's Edition of the entire 78-card deck in 2010. Llewellyn Worldwide published a mass market edition in 2011, and now in 2016 Schiffer Books is publishing a beautiful new edition.

Most people want to know how the Schiffer version is different from the Llewellyn version. First, the cards are bigger. They are 4"x6" and have a silver gilding on the edges. The graphic design is very different, with a new font and a blue border around each card. The book is full color on the inside, and the set comes in a sturdy, beautiful box.

I made a few changes in the text of the book, updating some of the divinatory meanings based on things I learned over the last few years. I also added a few new spreads at the back of the book. The artwork in the cards is the same, except I added a new detail to one card that was important to me. I'll see if anyone notices!

Where did the Gaian Tarot begin for you?

I had the desire to create a deck of my own back in the mid-1980s when I was deep into Goddess and Tarot studies, especially of the Motherpeace and Rider Waite Smith decks. But the thought of painting 78 cards was daunting. Later on, in the late 1990s, I went through a period of time where I let go of all my esoteric interests like tarot, astrology, and ritual. I moved to a small, rural island, built a straw bale house with my husband and started a wilderness awareness course of studies — learning about the native plants and animals, going deep into the spirit of Place.

Around 1999, I had a strong calling to create a deck, but I was not sure what the theme should be. I didn't want to do yet another RWS, because — why bother doing something that has been done so well, so many other times? I did not want to do a Goddess-themed deck for the same reason; I didn't feel that I had anything new to bring to yet another Goddess deck.

Then I realized I could bring together two great passions of mine — my love for the natural world as teacher and healer with my love for the rich, archetypal imagery of the tarot. I brought those two loves together in the Gaian Tarot.

How is the Gaian Tarot different from other tarot decks?

It's multicultural and contemporary, and is not an overtly esoteric deck. While I stayed true to the classic tarot structure and was inspired by the Rider Waite Smith deck, the deck is not a reworking of familiar RWS imagery. With each card, I asked myself: *Where is the voice of Nature in this card?*

I wanted to show a community of people, plants and animals all living in harmony with each other and the planet. In some ways the deck is a vision of what it could be like to live in the world. But it is a vision rooted in reality. All the figures in the deck are based on people that I know. Also, every card, even the challenging ones, offer advice and counsel on how to triumph over that particular challenge.

The Gaian Tarot was nine years in the making. Why so long?

A number of reasons, the first being the time-intensive nature of the medium I chose (colored pencil painting). There are 50 to 100 hours in each card, including 10-20 hours on each face alone. I completed the Majors first, and the originals are around 13"x19". I worked smaller for the Minors, at about 10"x15". I wasn't able to work full time on the artwork, as I had to earn a living and have a personal life as well. In retrospect, I think that the depth of my life experience during those nine years found its way into the deck and made it all the richer.


What can users of the deck expect from *The Gaian Tarot*?

They can expect to recognize themselves in the images, and to see the bonds of community and friendship. They can expect the Green Ones of the forest and shore to speak to them. They can expect to see many symbols in the suits and not just one (like swords or cups). They can expect to be delighted — and perhaps challenged — by the gender reversals in many of the cards. They can expect to see radically re-visioned Emperor, Hierophant and

court cards. They can expect to internalize the cycle of descent and return as mirrored in the Moon and Wheel cards, and in the structure of the Minors. They can expect to find a vision of hope and healing for themselves, and for our beloved Mother Earth.


